CALL TO ORDER

Chair Snyder called the County Road Administration Board quarterly meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. on Thursday, January 21, 2016 at the CRAB Office in Olympia.

CHAIR'S REPORT

Chair Snyder presented a plaque to Commissioner Koch in appreciation of his previous service on the Board.

He reminded those present to silence all electronic devices.

Approve January 21-22, 2016 Agenda

Chair Snyder advised the Board that if the agenda proceeded quickly, it was likely that staff reports would be moved to this day, in hopes that the roads would be better on Friday, and the Board members could leave early to get home.

Ms. Mayner noted the addition of Resolution 2016-002 to the agenda following item 4C. Second Vice-Chair Woods moved and Vice-Chair Stacy seconded to approve the agenda as amended. **Motion carried unanimously.**

Approve Minutes of October 29-30, 2015 CRABoard Meeting

Vice-Chair Stacy moved and Commissioner Schulte seconded to approve the minutes of the October 29-30, 2015 CRABoard meeting. **Motion carried unanimously.**

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

2015 Annual Report

Mr. Weber announced that the 2015 Annual Report has been posted on CRAB's website and that all interested parties have been notified via e-mail. Staff has mailed copies to various libraries and to all members of the Legislative Transportation Committee and their staff members.

Current Budget Status

Mr. Weber reviewed CRAB's current budget status. He noted that the agency is within \$1000.00 of allotment variances across all funds. He reminded the Board that in-state travel expenses are expected to be larger than usual in the following months due to staff travel for and to the 2016 NACE Conference in Tacoma in April.

He reported that the Governor's proposed supplemental budget gives CRAB slightly higher funding than the request made by the agency, and restores the RAP funding that was requested.

Veteran's Transition Support

Mr. Weber noted that Executive Order 13-01 currently does not pertain to CRAB, as this Board not an executive cabinet agency.

RURAL ARTERIAL PROGRAM

Program Status Report

Mr. Hart reported that 1,022 of 1,132 projects have been completed to date. Anticipated revenue to the end of the 2015-17 biennium is \$561,582,474. RAP expenditures to date total \$513,846,451. RAP obligations remaining are through the 2015-17 biennium total \$126,782,786.

He listed several projects facing design or construction lapsing in March and April 2016.

Regional Meetings Update

Mr. Hart reported on meetings held in November and December in the Northeast, Northwest, Puget Sound, and Southwest RAP Regions. The Southeast Region meeting was rescheduled to January 29, 2016 due to inclement weather.

At the meetings, staff notified the regions that the CRABoard elected to have a call for new projects for the 2017-2019 biennium, but that allocation of funds to new projects would be based on the balance in the account and existing project reimbursement demand. The call for preliminary proposals closes March 1, 2016 and the final prospectuses will be due September 1, 2016.

Staff reviewed the various funding sources available through RATA, CAPA, MVA, and Multi-Modal accounts per the 2015 state legislature; and the Systemic Safety tool in Mobility was highlighted.

Mr. Pohle and Mr. Moorhead informed the counties on compliance reporting and status, potential public hearing, maintenance management, and the gravel roads study conducted by CRAB.

Resolution 2016-001 - Apportion RATA Funds to Regions

Mr. Hart presented Resolution 2016-001 - Apportion RATA Funds to Regions. The resolution authorizes the accrued amount of \$3,272,780 now credited to RATA for November and December 2015 be apportioned to the regions by the established 2015-2017 biennium regional percentages after setting aside \$80,750 for administration.

After discussion, Commissioner Schulte moved and Commissioner Mielke seconded to approve Resolution 2016-001 - Apportion RATA Funds to Regions. **Motion carried unanimously.**

Resolution 2016-002 – Approve 2015-2017 RAP Projects and Allocate Estimated 2015-2017 RATA Funds

Mr. Hart presented Resolution 2016-002 - Approve 2015-2017 RAP Projects and Allocate Estimated 2015-2017 RATA Funds. The resolution authorizes funding of \$309,500 as match for \$2,088,000 in Federal Bridge Replacement Funds for Okanogan County's Joe Moses Road and Park City Loop Bridges.

After discussion, Commissioner Coffman moved and Commissioner Schulte seconded to approve Resolution 2016-002 - Approve 2015-2017 RAP Projects and Allocate Estimated 2015-2017 RATA Funds. **Motion carried unanimously.**

Project Request Actions Taken by CRAB Staff

Mr. Hart noted activities and requests handled by staff since the October 2015 CRABoard Meeting.

1. Mason County requested a scope change to their Cloquallum Road project, reducing the milepost limits from 5.85 – 6.85 to 5.85 – 6.60, with no change in RATA

funding. The request will eliminate widening and paving improvements at the west 0.25 miles of the project, increase design speed from 40 mph to 50 mph, realign the existing unsafe horizontal curve, and increase proposed roadway width from 28 feet to 34 feet.

The county plans to use existing \$900,000 RATA and \$250,000 county funding to build the improvements.

CRAB staff found that taken together, the changes result in a better overall project, focusing RATA and county funds on the highest priority deficiencies of the existing road. The changes increase the score of the project from 61.29 to 65.29. After review and confirmation with the CRAB Director, on January 13, 2016 an amended contract was offered to the county.

2. On December 7, 2015 CRAB received a reimbursement from Spokane County in the amount of \$1,500,000 for RATA funds that were used on their Bigelow Gulch 3 project in 2005. The paid-back funds were forwarded to the treasurer and have been deposited into the RATA account. CRAB staff found that the project did not accomplish the prospectus improvements agreed to in the CRAB/County Contract. The County elected to reimburse the funds and pursue the new funding offered by the CRAB Board to re-address the project needs.

3. Spokane County requested a two year extension of the lapsing date for their Forker Road project, from March 26, 2016 to March 26, 2018. The right of way review was extended, and delayed at one point, involving WSDOT and FHWA processes.

CRAB staff found the issues of project delay impacting the project were unforeseen and beyond the county's control, and therefore granted an extension in construction lapsing to March 26, 2018.

4. Lewis County has withdrawn Centralia Alpha Road from RATA funding. The county cited the need to reallocate their Federal STP funding from that project to their higher priority and more expensive Highway 603 project, which is also RATA funded. The county also committed to paying back \$152,283.80 of RATA funds used on Centralia Alpha Road.

Vice-Chair Snyder suggested that the county pursue a request for waiver of payback if they intend to continue the project in the future.

Chair Snyder called for a brief recess.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR'S REPORT

County Engineers/Public Works Directors

Mr. Olsen reported three changes in the roster of County Engineers since October 2015:

By letter on November 9, 2015, Wahkiakum County appointed Paul Lacy, PE, as County Engineer, effective September 21, 2015, following the resignation of County Engineer Peter Ringen, PE.

By email and attachment on December 23, 2015, Asotin County appointed Dustin Johnson, PE, as Public Works Director/County Engineer, effective October 12, 2015. Garfield County Engineer Grant Morgan, PE, had been serving as Acting County Engineer until then.

By email on January 12, 2016, Kittitas County appointed Mark Cook, PE, as Interim Acting County Engineer, effective January 8, 2016, following the resignation of County Engineer Doug D'Hondt, PE.

County Visits completed since October 2015

Numerous contacts with County Engineers took place in other venues.

State Auditor's Report

The 1997 State Auditor Office (SAO) audit of CRAB concluded that the minutes of the Board meetings needed specific mention of SAO audits of the counties and of any findings that might relate to the statutory responsibilities of CRAB. The minutes also need to reflect any recommendations from the CRABoard to staff in response to the audits. This report details our staff procedures to satisfy the SAO.

CRAB has reviewed 14 audit reports representing 14 counties since the October 2015 Board meeting. Four audits contained a total of five findings issued and none involved County Road Funds in some form. Any audits with county name in bold print revealed substantive findings involving County Road Funds, specifically:

Activities

Mr. Olsen reviewed a list of his activities since the October 2015 CRABoard meeting.

PROPOSED WAC CHANGES

Mr. Pohle reported on a meeting held in the CRAB offices on January 8, 2016 between staff, Board members and representatives of the Sheriff's Association, as directed by the Board at the October 2015 meeting. He presented staff's revised recommendations for WAC 136-25 Standard of Good Practice-Traffic Law Enforcement Expenditures resulting from that meeting.

WAC 136-25-010 is specific to WAC 136-150-020, 136-150-021, 136-150-022, and 136-150-030 relating to road levy, road levy diversion, and traffic law enforcement.

WAC 136-25-020 states that diversion of road levy funds may only be for traffic law enforcement within unincorporated areas of the county. To preserve RATA eligibility, road levy funds diverted pursuant to RCW 36.33.220 may only be used for traffic law enforcement within the unincorporated areas of counties, except those counties with a population of less than eight thousand, RCW 36.79.140 and WAC 136.150.030.

WAC 136-25-030 establishes eligible traffic law enforcement activities on county roads. For purposes of maintaining RATA eligibility, should the legislative authority vote and budget to divert road levy funds, the following traffic law enforcement activities occurring in unincorporated county areas are the only activities that can be funded by county road levy funds.

- (1) Speed limit and other traffic law enforcement;
- (2) Collision investigation documenting/reporting;
- (3) Oversize vehicle (weight, length, width, and height) enforcement;
- (4) Special traffic emphasis patrols;

- (5) Facilitating the removal of abandoned vehicles from the county road and rights of way;
 - (6) Facilitating the removal of roadway and right of way obstructions at the request of the county engineer;
 - (7) Investigating illegal littering and dumping on county road rights of way;
 - (8) Sign damage investigation and enforcement;
 - (9) Road condition enforcement, including mud, water, debris, or spills;
 - (10) Rights of way encroachment investigation and enforcement at the request of the county engineer;
 - (11) Maintenance and construction zone traffic enforcement;
 - (12) Special road department vehicle collision investigation at the request of the county engineer; and
 - (13) Other activities clearly related to county road law enforcement needs, as mutually agreed upon in writing by the county road engineer and the county sheriff.
- Disagreements shall be elevated to the county legislative authority.

WAC 136-25-040 states that the certification required by WAC 136-150-022 shall be on a form provided by the county road administration board. Each county shall maintain adequate records of annual traffic law enforcement expenditures in such format and detail to demonstrate that the funds were used only for the traffic law enforcement activities set out in WAC 136-25-030.

WAC 136-25-050 states that the county road administration board shall provide model documents for counties to use to establish agreements (relationships) between the county legislative authority and the county sheriff and between the county road engineer and the county sheriff for the use of county road levy funds for traffic law enforcement. The agreements are discretionary, but if used should list which activities set out in WAC 136-25-030 are subject to the agreement.

Mr. Pohle also proposed to amend WAC 136-150-022 to read:

In those counties in which diverted road levy or transfer of road funds has been budgeted for traffic law enforcement, the county sheriff shall submit a certification showing the actual expenditure for traffic law enforcement in the previous budget year, on a form provided by the County Road Administration Board, provided that counties with a population of less than eight thousand shall be exempt from this requirement. Such certification shall be submitted to the county road administration board no later than April 1 of each year. Each county shall maintain records of annual traffic law enforcement expenditures in such format and detail as to demonstrate that the funds were used for traffic law enforcement.

Definition of Traffic Law Enforcement: For purposes of this chapter, traffic law enforcement is defined as engaging in the activities listed in WAC 136-25-030 in unincorporated county locations.

Mr. Pohle requested that the Board to set a public hearing for April 14, 2016 at 2:00 pm.

Following discussion, Commissioner Schulte moved and Commissioner Mielke seconded to set a public hearing for April 14, 2016 at 2:00 pm. **Motion passed unanimously.**

Chair Snyder moved staff reports forward from the Friday agenda.

STAFF UPDATES

Intergovernmental Policy

Mr. Monsen reported on his activities since the October 2015 CRABoard meeting, including the County Engineer Training held at CRAB December 8-10, 2015, with 12 participants in attendance from eight counties. The next session is scheduled for May.

He noted that the next update to the County Engineers' and Public Works Directors' Manual will be released in early February.

He asked the Board if CRAB staff should be more proactive in creating training opportunities for WSAC and possibly WACO members. The Board indicated that they feel the current level of promotion is adequate.

Maintenance Management Update

Mr. Moorhead reported on his activities since the October 2015 CRABoard meeting.

He noted that visits to 16 individual counties regarding the Gravel Roads Study were completed on November 3, 2015. A request to the counties to utilize the annual Maintenance Management Plan submitted to CRAB in December to estimate the annual maintenance costs per mile for both gravel and BST roads will close January 29. The preparation of the final report is under way, and he plans to present it at the April 2016 CRABoard Meeting.

He presented a summary of CRAB training held since the October 2015 Board meeting, and future training scheduled through April 2016.

Compliance and Data Analysis Report

Mr. Pohle reported on the counties' compliance in submitting the six reports due to CRAB by December 31 of each year, noting that 38 of the 39 counties had submitted all of the forms in the required electronic formats by the deadline. A few failed to submit required supporting documents on time, but did so quickly after being contacted by staff.

He noted that all counties are required by WAC 136-28 to have responded to/processed at least 90% of the county road collision reports submitted to them for coding by December 31 of each calendar year. For 2015, 35 counties were fully compliant, and the remaining four achieved compliance by January 15, 2016.

He reported on his activities since the October 2015 CRABoard meeting.

Information Services

Mr. Hillesland gave the Board a brief history of the Design Systems Program and introduced Mr. Ayres, who spoke of the current status of the program and its future direction.

He reported that the UAV program is progressing, and demonstrated a recent mapping of a Columbia County stockpile site.

In other business, Commissioner Mielke announced that this would be his last CRABoard meeting, as he is retiring from public service effective January 31.

Chair Snyder recessed the CRABoard meeting at 4:34 p.m. on January 21, 2016. The meeting will resume January 22, 2016 at 8:30 a.m.

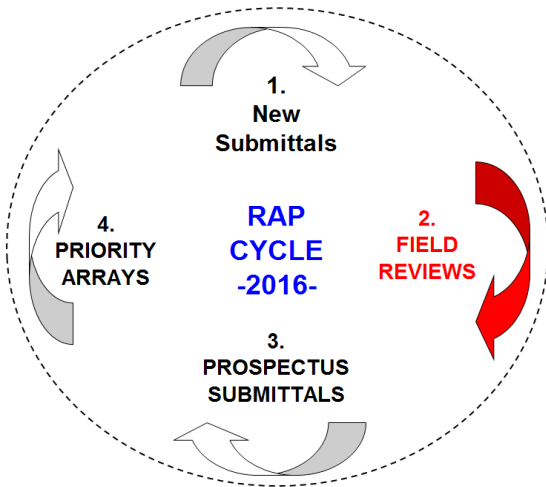
EXECUTIVE SESSION

Chair Snyder closed the meeting at 10:40 a.m. on Friday, January 22, 2016.

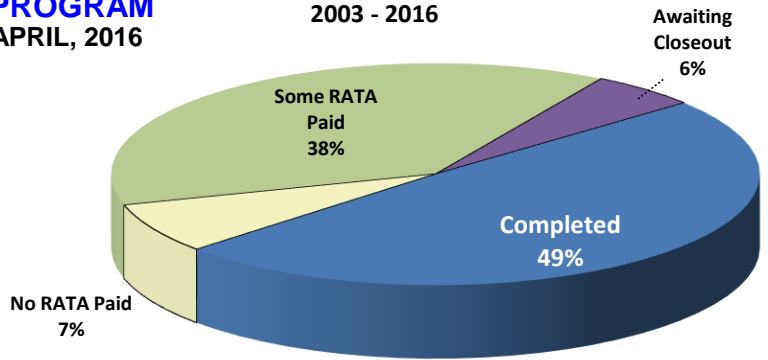

PRELIMINARY PROSPECTUS SUBMITTALS – RAP PROGRAM

At its October 2015 meeting, the CRABoard initiated a call for new projects to be funded by the RATA during the 2017-2019 biennium. All preliminary proposals have been received (due March 1, 2016) and CRAB staff have commenced field reviews with the counties.

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Total requested RATA funds from preliminary proposals is \$152 million. Revenue available is estimated at \$40 million, of which approximately \$23 million will be allocated to existing partially funded projects.

Of the 125 projects submitted, roughly half will be submitted as final proposals which are due in September.

Counties are again showing more interest in **2R projects** since they are easier to submit, fund and build. Most of the 2R projects will likely stay on for the final submittal.

Project types:

2R = Resurface and Restore

3R = Rehabilitate (bring to full design standards were feasible) on existing alignment

RC = Reconstruction mostly on new alignment.

DR = Drainage structures such as culverts and short span (<20 ft.) bridges.

FA = Bridge funded by FHWA, for which county seeks RAP as matching funds.

SA = Bridge to be funded by county and RAP.

Project Actions Taken by CRAB Staff – Quarter 1, 2016

I. Kitsap County's Glenwood Road - RAP Project 1810-01 – Construction lapsing extension:

Kitsap County, per their letter dated February 2, 2016 requested a one-year extension of the lapsing date for their Glenwood Road project, from April 26, 2016 to April 26, 2017

The county had faced extended time to negotiate right of way and easements for the project, and could not guarantee these could be accomplished before the construction lapsing date, April 26, 2016.

CRABstaff found the issues of project delay impacting the project were unforeseen and beyond the county's control, and therefore granted an extension in construction lapsing to April 26, 2017.

II. Jefferson County's Dosewallips Road- RAP Project 1614-01 - Construction lapsing extension:

Jefferson County, per their letter dated February 23, 2016 requested a two-year extension of the lapsing date for their Dosewallips Road Emergency project, from March 10, 2016 to March 10, 2018

After accomplishing repairs to restore the roadway to its' original roadway configuration, the county pursued additional improvements to prevent further slides on the damaged section. However due to loss of staff and larger than usual construction season in 2015 (including RAP funded Paradise Bay Road), the county had struggled to commence the betterment work. In order to continue to work toward the improvements, the county requested an extension to the projects' construction milestone.

CRABstaff found the issues of project delay impacting this second phase of the project were unforeseen and beyond the county's control, and therefore granted an extension in construction phase lapsing to March 10, 2018.

III. Whitman County's Almota Road - RAP Project 3810-01 – Construction lapsing extension:

Whitman County, per their letter dated October 14, 2015 requested a two-year extension of the lapsing date for their Almota Road 4 project, from March 26, 2016 to March 26, 2018

The county had gained a scope increase to this project in October of 2015 allowing extension of the project limits in order to make vertical alignment improvements at no additional RATA cost. Design work for these improvements has taken considerable time, therefore the county requested a construction time extension in order to finish full design.

CRABstaff found the delay impacting the project was unforeseen and beyond the county's control, since it only recently realized the project cost savings that would allow them to do the additional alignment work. The CRAB Director therefore granted an extension in construction lapsing to March 26, 2018.

WAIVER OF PAYBACK OF EXPENDED RATA FUNDS
CENTRALIA ALPHA ROAD, MP 10.60 – 12.30
RAP PROJECT NUMBER 2110-01
LEWIS COUNTY

I. Nature of Request:

Lewis County has requested, per their letter dated April 1, 2016, that the CRABoard waive reimbursement of \$123,640.22 in expended RATA funds used for design of their withdrawn Centralia Alpha Road project. The county has used \$152,283.80 in RATA funding for design to date, and proposes to pay back the \$28,643.58 difference. Waiver of payback of RATA funds must be considered by the CRABoard per WAC 136-167-030.

According to CRABoard Resolution 2015-02, the director or designee is given authority for approval of withdrawals and terminations as set forth in WAC 136-167 except that waiving of a required RATA reimbursement for such projects shall remain with the CRABoard.

II. Guidelines for consideration of waiver requests:

A. WAC 136-167-030, Termination of approved project after RATA reimbursement.

‘...(2) If a county terminates an uncompleted RATA funded project for which RATA reimbursement has been made, for other than an unanticipated scope change, and does not want to be required to repay the county road administration board for all RATA funds received, a letter of request signed by the chair of the board of county commissioners or the county executive as appropriate must be sent to the county road administration board. The request must include:

- (a) An explanation of the reasons that the project will not proceed to completion;
- (b) A statement of the amount of RATA funds which the county does not want to repay; and
- (c) An explanation of why the county believes full repayment should not be made.

If the county road administration board grants the request, the county shall repay all RATA funds not exempted from repayment, the CRAB/country contract will be amended, and the remaining RATA funds will be allocated to other projects within the region. If the county road administration board denies the request, full repayment shall be made as provided in subsection (1) of this section...’

B. The CRABoard, at its January 2002 meeting, determined the following:

“After discussion, the Board determined that generally, payback of all project related costs, including design, right of way and construction are eligible to be waived by the CRABoard, and that the CRABoard will continue to consider each waiver request on a case-by-case basis. The CRABoard directed staff to develop a waiver of payback request form for counties to use.”

II. Project Background:

Funding and expenditure:

The Centralia Alpha Road project was submitted by the county on August 28, 2008 requesting \$1,000,000 in RATA funds. Total project cost at that time was listed as \$3,000,000.

The county has expended \$152,283.80 RATA funds for design of the project, submitting 12 requests for reimbursement from February, 2012 through July, 2015.

Previously approved scope change:

The county requested a scope change to the original project MP 10.15 – 11.85, adjusting the mileposts to: 10.60 – 12.30, in a letter dated July 9, 2014. Reasons given for the change were lack of cooperation from land owners for right of way needs and the location of an adjacent stream that would require fish barrier removal costs (\$200,000). The project length remained the same since the county extended the project to milepost 12.30 where Oppelt Road connects at the east end (see attached map). This change was approved by the CRABoard on July 31, 2014.

Initial Withdrawal:

In its' letter dated January 11, 2016, the county withdrew the project from RATA funding, offering to pay back the entire expended RATA amount. The county cited a major increase in cost (now at \$3,670,500) and the need to focus its' federal STP fund allocation on the Highway 603 project (\$4,270,000 in cost, \$1,125,000 RATA). During discussions about this withdraw request at the January 21, 2016 CRABoard meeting, the board suggested the county consider seeking a waiver of payback for some of the spent RATA funds since the county had expressed commitment to building most of the project in the near future.

Rescinding a portion of original request:

In a follow up letter dated February 9, 2016, the county rescinded the repayment portion of the original withdrawal letter in order to pursue a waiver of payback request. CRABstaff met with county staff on February 26, 2016 to outline conditions and parameters for requesting a waiver of payback, again affirming the county's intent to pursue the project and retain most of the original scope at a later time. CRABstaff suggested the county clearly outline the paid RATA funds that it considered would be used for design of the future project and resubmit a letter, with attachments requesting waiver of pay back.

III. Final Request:

The county's April 1, 2016 withdrawal and waiver of payback request letter indicates that it intends submit for RATA funding and build a project that will be shorter by 26.5%. The county lists total and RATA usable design costs on a future project as follows:

After reviewing invoices for wetlands work done by the consultant, and removing half of all field work and report writing tasks performed prior to final project limits, the county claims 77% of the costs would apply to a new project.

The geotechnical work performed by the consultant has been done only on a portion (where all the major grading work has been planned) of the project that the county will retain as part of a future project. Therefore, the county requests retaining 100% of these costs.

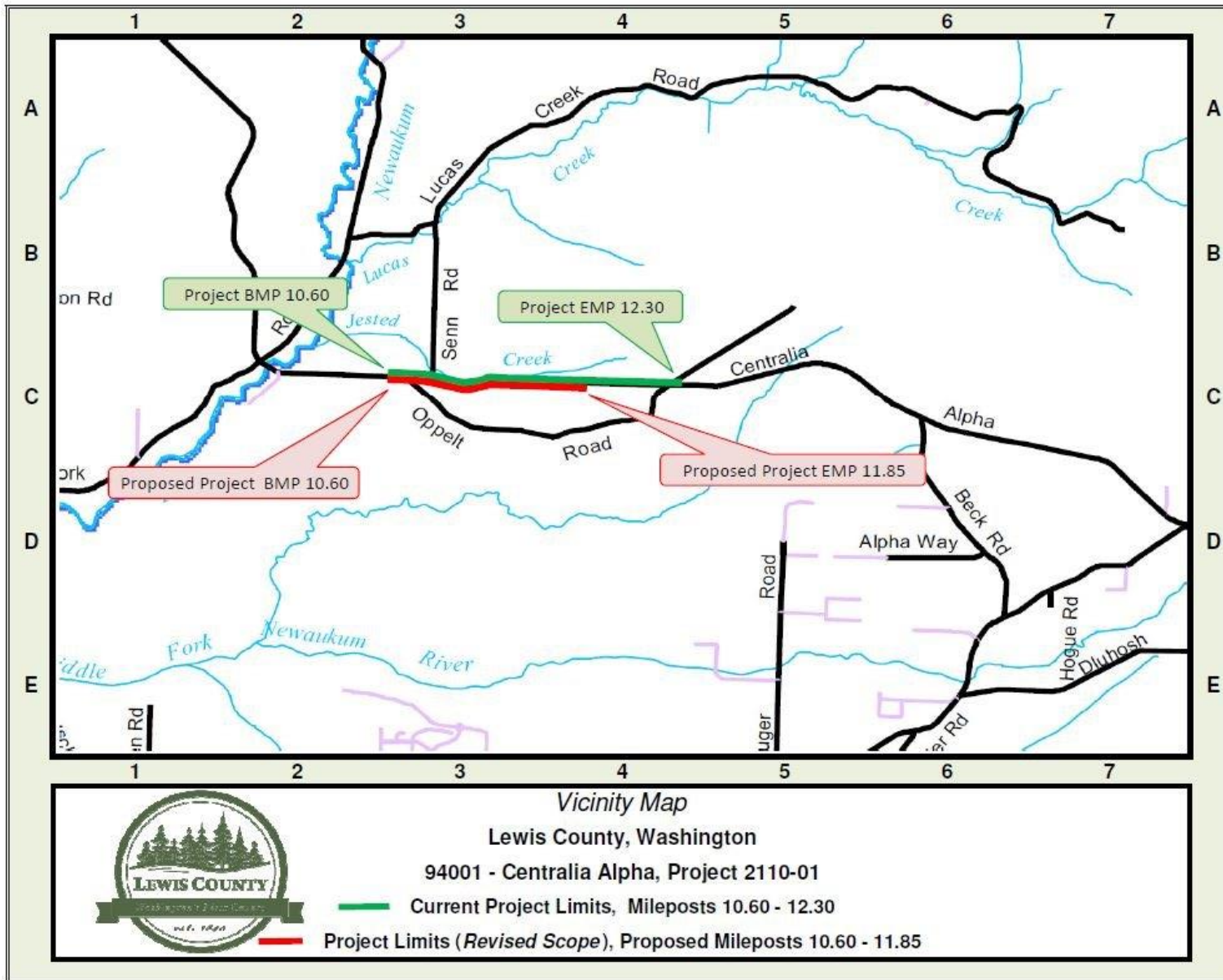
The county also seeks to retain 73.5% of RATA paid for its' engineering costs, based on reduced length of the future project.

IV. Planned Scope of future project:

The planned project will be from milepost 10.60 – 11.85. The project will address the area of the road where sliding is occurring. The project will also realign the Centralia Alpha Rd/Senn Rd/Oppelt Rd intersection. Two vertical curves will be improved. There will also be drainage and storm-water improvements. Guardrail and other safety features will be installed. The new roadway will consist of crushed surfacing base course, crushed surfacing top course, and paved surfacing, as determined by the engineer.

V. Staff Finding and Recommendation:

Staff finds the county has fulfilled the WAC requirements regarding request for waiver of payback. The county has clearly explained that increases in cost to both the Centralia Alpha Road and Highway 603 projects are such that its' STP funding (which provided a major portion of the Centralia Alpha project funding) is now directed to Highway 603, thus prompting withdrawal of Centralia Alpha Road. Staff also finds both the dollar amounts and justification for those amounts are clearly described by the county in its' request. Further, the county has repeatedly indicated the project will remain on its' six-year construction program and plans to construct a majority of the original improvements in the near future. Staff therefore recommends approval of the waiver of payback of \$123,640.22 in expended RATA funds used for design of the withdrawn Centralia Alpha Road project, and that the county reimburse to the CRABoard the remaining \$28,643.58.



ADDITIONAL CONSTRUCTION LAPSING TIME EXTENSION

NORTH MEYERS ROAD BRIDGE #502, MP 2.81– 2.83
YAKIMA COUNTY RAP PROJECT 3907-01

I. Nature of Request:

Yakima County, per their email dated April 12, 2016 has requested an additional construction lapsing time extension, per WAC 136-167-040 (5), for the North Meyers Road Bridge #502 project. The project is scheduled to lapse on April 19, 2016 after the county had already received a 2-year time extension to April 19, 2015, plus a CRABoard initiated 1-year extension (April 2015 CRABoard meeting) to April 19, 2016. The county again requests the CRABoard take additional action to extend the lapsing date to October 31, 2016.

II. Background:

III. Current status:

Since the county’s extension request last year, March 26, 2015, it has made progress on securing the necessary rights of way through condemnation. However, the condemnation action was not settled until January 25, 2016, which resulted in right of way not being certified by WSDOT Local Programs until March 15, 2016. Also, in December, 2015 the county was notified that due to changes in the federal funding amounts for the project, they would need to amend the STIP. This process was undertaken immediately, but was not completed at the MPO/RTPO until March 18, 2016. The county was finally notified April 12, 2016 that the amendment was approved by FHWA. This did not allow enough time to complete fund obligation and bid advertisement by the current lapsing date, April 19, 2016.

The county requests an additional extension to October 31, 2016 in order to have flexibility in coordinating the construction on this project with the replacement of the adjacent Bridge #485. The county’s original objective was to bid both projects together. Because of the condemnation action on this project, the county elected to bid the #485 project separately. At this time, the

contractor on the #485 project requires access to that bridge from both ends and across the #502 bridge. Because of uncertainties in scheduling the #485 work until completion of a Test Pile program, the county is unable to identify, for potential bidders on the #502 bridge, how work on the two bridges must be coordinated. The county states that the worst case scenario could be that in-water work on the #502 project cannot be completed in the 2016 work window. In that case, the county plans to wait and advertise the project in late September / early October of this year. If the #485 contractor is able to accept an earlier start date on the #502 bridge which would allow completion of the necessary in-water work this year, the county would bid the #502 project as soon as possible.

III. Staff Findings and Recommendation:

CRAB staff has reviewed the project site and the extension request.

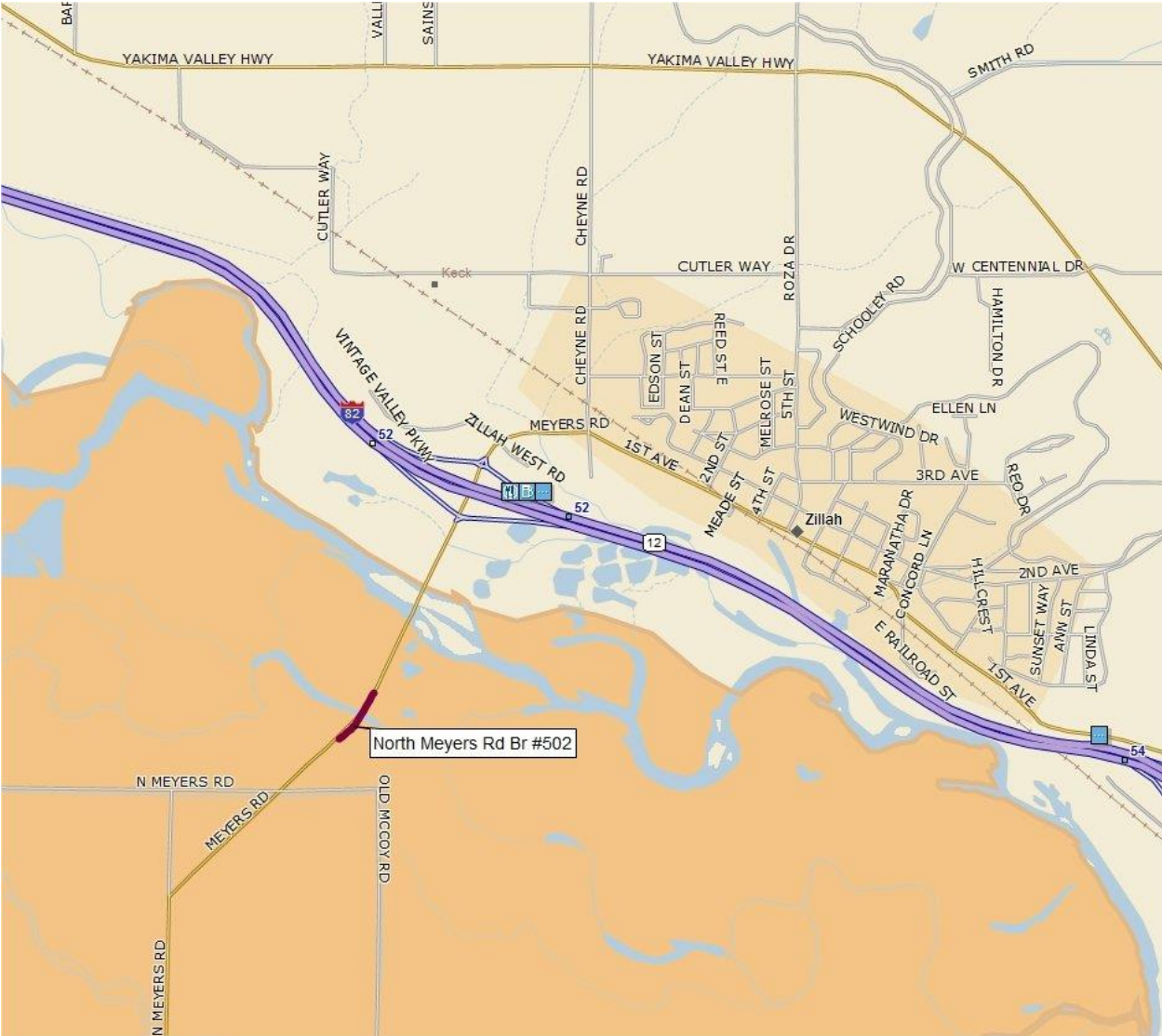
Staff finds:

- The county has diligently pursued the project, which has been tied to other projects and multiple right of way and cultural issues.
- The county has acquired the needed right of way over the last year after gaining the extension that was approved in April of 2015, making significant advances to construction.
- The additional time needed to effectively coordinate two adjacent bridge construction projects warrants an additional, relatively short, extension in the lapsing date for RATA funding.
- The interest of public safety, health and general welfare is cited in WAC 136-167-040 (5) (below) as the basis for CRABoard to grant an additional extension. This request serves that purpose.

CRAB staff therefore recommends an additional extension be granted, to October 31, 2016 per WAC 136-167-040, which will allow the county to retain its RATA funding while it continues to advance the Bridge #502 project to construction.

WAC 136-167-040 (5)

....(5) The CRABoard may in its discretion determine that for the public safety, health or general welfare, an additional extension is necessary. If such a determination is made, the CRABoard may grant an additional extension and set the duration thereof.

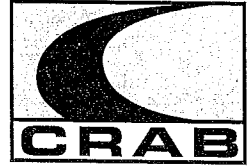
Spokane County has pursued RATA funded improvements on Bigelow Gulch and connecting routes over the past 26 years, beginning in 1988.

In compliance with state law (RCW 36.78.040), the three positions must be filled under the following populations:

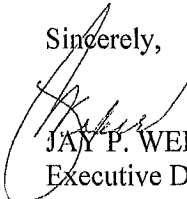
- Commissioner Snyder = population between 20,000 and 125,000

Chapter 136-25 WAC
STANDARD OF GOOD PRACTICE—TRAFFIC LAW ENFORCEMENT EXPENDITURES

NEW SECTION

WAC 136-25-010 Purpose and authority. RCW 36.79.140 sets forth the conditions under which counties are eligible to receive funds from the rural arterial trust account (RATA). Chapter 136-150 WAC describes how the RATA provisions will be implemented by the county road administration board. This chapter is specific to WAC 136-150-020, 136-150-021, 136-150-022, and 136-150-030 relating to road levy, road levy diversion, and traffic law enforcement.

NEW SECTION

WAC 136-25-020 Diversion of road levy funds may only be for traffic law enforcement within unincorporated areas of the county. To preserve RATA eligibility, road levy funds diverted pursuant to RCW 36.33.220 may only be used for traffic law enforcement within the unincorporated areas of counties, except those counties with a population of less than eight thousand, RCW 36.79.140 and WAC 136.150.030.

NEW SECTION

WAC 136-25-030 Eligible traffic law enforcement activities on county roads. For purposes of maintaining RATA eligibility, should the legislative authority vote and budget to divert road levy funds, the following traffic law enforcement activities occurring in unincorporated county areas are the only activities that can be funded by county road levy funds.

- (1) Speed limit and other traffic law enforcement;
- (2) Collision investigation documenting/reporting;
- (3) Oversize vehicle (weight, length, width, and height) enforcement;
- (4) Special traffic emphasis patrols;
- (5) Facilitating the removal of abandoned vehicles from the county road and rights of way;
- (6) Facilitating the removal of roadway and right of way obstructions at the request of the county engineer;
- (7) Investigating illegal littering and dumping on county road rights of way;
- (8) Sign damage investigation and enforcement;
- (9) Road condition enforcement, including mud, water, debris, or spills;
- (10) Rights of way encroachment investigation and enforcement at the request of the county engineer;

- (11) Maintenance and construction zone traffic enforcement;
- (12) Road department vehicle special collision investigation at the request of the county engineer; and
- (13) Other activities clearly related to county road law enforcement needs, as mutually agreed upon in writing by the county road engineer and the county sheriff. Disagreements shall be elevated to the county legislative authority.

NEW SECTION

WAC 136-25-040 Compliance and documentation. The certification required by WAC 136-150-022 shall be on a form provided by the county road administration board. Each county shall maintain adequate records of annual traffic law enforcement expenditures in such format and detail to demonstrate that the funds were used only for the traffic law enforcement activities set out in WAC 136-25-030.

NEW SECTION

WAC 136-25-050 Agreements. The county road administration board shall provide model documents for counties to use to establish agreements (relationships) between the county legislative authority and the county sheriff and between the county road engineer and the county sheriff for the use of county road levy funds for traffic law enforcement. The agreements are discretionary but, if used, should list which activities set out in WAC 136-25-030 are subject to the agreement.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 03-21-136, filed 10/21/03, effective 11/21/03)

WAC 136-150-022 **Ascertaining the expenditures for traffic law enforcement.** In those counties in which diverted road levy or transfer of road funds has been budgeted for traffic law enforcement, the county sheriff shall submit a certification showing the actual expenditure for traffic law enforcement in the previous budget year, on a form provided by the county road administration board, provided that counties with a population of less than eight thousand shall be exempt from this requirement. Such certification shall be submitted to the county road administration board no later than April 1st of each year. Each county shall maintain records of annual traffic law enforcement expenditures in such format and detail as to demonstrate that the funds were used for traffic law enforcement.

Definition of traffic law enforcement: For purposes of this chapter, traffic law enforcement is defined as engaging in the activities listed in WAC 136-25-030 in unincorporated county locations.

Thank you for this information. I do have one comment for the CRAB board to consider in their deliberations of WAC 136-150-022. The amended language states in the second underlined section:

Each county shall maintain records of annual traffic law enforcement expenditures in such format and detail as to demonstrate that the funds were used for traffic law enforcement. Definition of traffic law enforcement: For purposes of this chapter, traffic law enforcement is defined as engaging in the activities listed in WAC 136-25-030 in unincorporated county locations.

My Comment:

I believe this language should be changed to state "Each county Sheriff shall maintain". There is an important disconnect in the proposed language. The certification is signed by the county Sheriff but the Sheriff is not responsible to maintain the records supporting the certification.

The regular law enforcement and traffic law enforcement activity of each deputy is legally only under the control of our elected Sheriff. Neither the Board of County Commissioners nor any other department in the county is in a position to accurately keep records of the minute by minute and day to day activities of deputies, that is the Sheriff's prerogative.

Suggesting another department maintain the records sets up a conflict of interest between one department's desire for funding and another department's desire for accurate reporting. It also creates a situation where the record keeper or certifier could get in trouble because of inaccuracies or false information which they didn't generate but simply reported.

County government is convoluted enough without setting up more potential problems. I request you change the language above to reflect the Sheriff maintains the records and submits the certification of expenditures.

COMPLIANCE

STANDARDS OF GOOD PRACTICE

February 1, 2016 required submittals: Road Levy Certification

31 of the 39 counties submitted the required form by the February 1st deadline. Three of the eight delinquent counties notified CRAB staff that circumstances beyond the County Engineer's control would likely delay submittal of the road levy certifications a few days beyond the deadline. Two of the remaining five submitted their forms on February 2nd, one the Assessor had yet to complete their work but CRAB was not notified, and the remaining two were unaware of the deadline.

April 1, 2016 required submittals:

- Annual Certification**
- CAPP Accomplishments report**
- Annual Construction report**
- Fish Passage Barrier Removal Cost Report**
- Traffic Enforcement Expenditures Cert.**
- Annual Certification for MMS**
- County Ferry System Report**

38 of the 39 counties' required submittals were transmitted to CRAB by the deadline. The remaining county transmitted their submittals the next business day. There are two issues of note: One is that about 15% of counties have yet to update their Bridge and Inspection reports to contain the statutory minimum requirements. CRAB staff will continue to work with these counties in an effort to bring these reports up to minimum requirements. Second is that several counties are inconsistent in documenting their County Forces Construction projects on the Annual Construction Report. Mainly, this is to do with project advertisement dates. CRAB staff will continue to work with these counties.

Bridge Inspection Certification – WAC 136-20-040

The Director of Highways and Local Programs has certified to CRAB that all counties have current inspections on file with the Department.

Per the SAO's recommendation, I hereby certify that I have reviewed all of the above compliance reporting with the Deputy Director.

Therefore, based on the April 1 submittals, SAO audit reviews for 2014 and 2015, and the performance of the 39 counties during the year 2015, I recommend that all 39 counties receive their Certificates of Good Practice for fiscal year 2016.

Vacancy in Position of County Engineer:

Kittitas County: The County had conducted interviews in March but they have not yet notified CRAB of any decision.

County Audits – For Fiscal Year 2014 & 2015

Skamania County – CRAB staff has been monitoring a continuing Finding which effects the Road Fund. For at least three consecutive audits, the SAO has issued a Finding that the county's financial condition continues to decline and is at risk of not being able to meet its current obligations and maintain services. CRAB staff continues to support county Public Works staff on a consultative basis.

Proposed New Standard of Good Practice – Traffic Law Enforcement

At the January 2016 CRABoard meeting, we reported on the workshop held with the Sheriff's organization representatives and the minor edits recommended resulting from that meeting. The CRABoard set a public hearing date and time for the April meeting to consider adoption of the proposed new standard of good practice, WAC 136-25 Traffic Law Enforcement Expenditures, and amendment to WAC 136-150-022 concerning RAP eligibility.

Staff recommends that the CRABoard approve adoption of the new standard of good practice, WAC 136-25 Traffic Law Enforcement Expenditures, and the amendment to WAC 136-150-022 as presented.

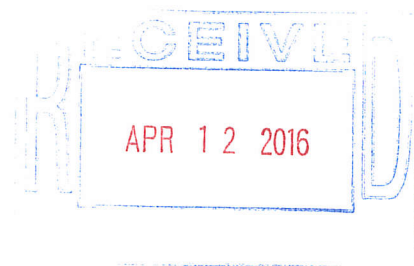
